

DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE



We're Looking Forward to Arrival of Our Northern Friends



Hello fellow Rockstar H.O.G. Chapter members. As the weather begins to cool, those of us who are permanent Florida residents are starting to dust off our leathers. At the same time, we welcome back our members from the North as they start returning to Florida. We've missed you. We hope to see you on upcoming rides and events.

If you missed the September General Membership Meeting you missed a lot of information regarding survey results, rides, events and activities, and schedule changes. See the Activity Director's article in this newsletter for more detailed information.

I would like to thank all members who participated in two important surveys. Your input is important and the Board and the Strategic Planning Committee are working on prioritizing your comments so we can address what is most important to you first.

Here are the results of the Strategic Planning Committee's survey:

- Are social activities important 60% was the average ranking
- Interest in Outdoor BBQ's 75% was the average ranking
- The importance of Bike Safety Training 70% said it important
- Interest in Evening events 58% was the average ranking

- Interest in overnight rides 50% was the average ranking
- Interest in longer rides 60% average ranking
- Interest in national park rides 60% average ranking
- Interested in rides to and from the destination 66% average ranking

In addition, many significant written comments were received. The Strategic Planning committee has combined like comments and created these four comment categories:

Rides, Environment, Covid and Social.

They will now prioritize the comments within these categories and recommend changes and action to the Board.

Following the cancellation of the November Chapter Anniversary Party, your Board also conducted a member survey. The subject was Social and Special Events. Without going into the detail of every question, the result was clear. Members want outdoor meetings and events. When food is served, they want a buffet-style meal.

The Board will respond to members' comments as swiftly as possible. For example, October and November General Membership meetings will be held outside at Rockstar H-D. December's meeting will be held at Lakes Park in Fort Myers. Watch for more details.

I anticipate 2022 will be a year of many changes. Stay tuned. And enjoy the ride.

Welcome New Rockstar H.O.G. Members!

Thanks to everyone who turned out in their masks for the September general membership meeting; just a reminder that our October meeting will be outside at Rockstar Harley-Davidson. Please bring your own chair or use one of the dealer's seats.

We had some new faces at the September meeting: A big H.O.G. welcome to Rich Ennis, Stephen Despin, and Scott Sheppard.

We've had a few Chapter members who took the Collier – S.M.A.R.T. class (Safe Motorcycle and Rider Techniques.) It was offered at no cost by deputies with the Collier Sheriff's Motor Unit. Attendees said it was very intense. As I mentioned at the meeting, I was too late in trying to sign up for the November class but was able to register for a future opportunity.

Chapter member Terri Brown, the first female student in the local training, said she'd to it again in a heartbeat.

"It was incredible," Terri said. "They teach you about turning your head to make sharp turns, how to ride into a curve, hand signals and the proper way to slow down traffic when we are group riding to keep it safe."

Chapter Road Captain Larry Burgess is another class graduate. Says Larry: "The S.M.A.R.T. course is the next step in motorcycle training every biker should utilize after the basic training course required by the state of Florida to obtain an endorsement on your driver's license. Even seasoned riders would find this course to be challenging to their current skills, especially the slow maneuver techniques. I highly recommend this course for every H.O.G. member. It is my personal goal to take this course or one like it every one to two years."



The training is held on a Saturday and Sunday. Some of the first day on the tarmac involves navigating cones at slow speeds. As many of us know, slow speeds can lead to toppled motorcycles.

How to protect that costly investment? Fortunately, it can be as simple as well-placed pool noodles cut to protect the engine and saddlebag guards, or for about \$30, you can buy plastic sleeves shaped to snap onto engine and saddlebag guards. These sleeves will protect against scratches and scuffs, as I know firsthand. Some riders use zip ties to help secure their Pro Guards just to be safe. These can be ordered from Amazon, where they got positive reviews.





Here's a Look at October-themed Harley-Davidson History

As motorcycle riding became popular in the early twentieth century, so too did endurance contests and races. Harry Ward, the author of a 1912 Washington Times article, provided a glimpse into Harley-Davidson's integral role in building bikes for endurance rides. On October 13, 1912, Washington-area motorcycle enthusiasts participated in the National Capital Motorcycle Club's endurance race. Due to bad weather, just nine riders participated in the first endurance run. The two Harley-Davidson motorcycles in the race finished with perfect scores.

Harley-Davidson became an icon for perfect scores in endurance races. According to Ward, the world-famous Harley-Davidson motorcycle became known as "The King of the Road," and even more, gained a positive reputation as "100% Perfect," or "The Greatest Endurance Motorcycle on the Market." Harley-Davidson motorcycles had earned a perfect 1,000-point score at the Seventh Annual Federation of American Motorcyclists Endurance and Reliability Contest just four years earlier, which only added to the prestige for this American motorcycle brand.

Harley-Davidson quickly emerged as a builder of reliable, quality motorcycles after Milwaukee residents William S. Harley and Arthur and Walter Davidson started it in a shed in 1903. Not long after, the company adopted a logo that would become recognizable just about anywhere, the "Bar & Shield," which was created in 1910. The firm concentrated on building reliable machines that could handle endurance rides. The perfect finish that a couple of Harley-Davidson riders earned in Washington on October 14, 1912, came as no surprise. Originally, Harley-Davidson started out with a single-cylinder engine, as that is what they could fit on the bike frame. It would not take long for the team to introduce an engine that would be able to produce more power;

adding a second cylinder, the V-twin. Named for the 45-degree angle at which the cylinders were configured, this design would become an icon of the Harley-Davidson motorcycle. The firm's V-twin model, which came out it 1909, proved to be quite successful. As business ramped up with



each subsequent event victory, so did the need for a much larger manufacturing facility. The small shed producing motorcycles in Milwaukee in 1903 soon grew into a six-story manufacturing facility. The factory manufactured bikes, as well as spare parts and accessories. Not only did the American motorcycle manufacturer gain immense popularity in the United States, but they also secured their first export to Japan in 1912.

Harry Ward's article in October of 1912 not only shed light on just how popular the "King of the Road" would become but helped to publicize the dependability that this machine offered in endurance races. Constantly looking for new innovative designs, Harley-Davidson upped the ante with their iconic V-twin motor and offered spare parts, which was a first for the company. By branding the motorcycle with distinct "Bar & Shield" logo, people would begin to associate Harley-Davidson with endurance and victory. Dominating the industry, and a true recognition of their reliability, Harley-Davidson became a major supplier to the military. In fact, in WWI the military purchased more than half of the motorcycles produced by Harley-Davidson. Motorcycle clubs began to pop up everywhere, and to this day, the legendary Harley-Davidson continues to flood the market with remarkable success.

SAFETY OFFICER'S MESSAGE



Motorcycles Can Make You Happier...and Hard of Hearing

The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), part of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), recommends that workers should not be exposed to sound levels above 85 decibels in an eight-hour work day, and notes that noise levels of 100 decibels become damaging to the ear after just 15 minutes of exposure.

Testing done by researchers from the University of South Alabama and William Patterson University, using an acoustically engineered dummy head and microphones, found that at speeds above 40 kph (about 25 mph), wind noise surpassed any noise from the motorcycle. At the highest speed tested, 120 kph (about 74 mph), noise exceeded 100 decibels at all the frequencies they measured.

Put those two facts together and you get this: If you ride your motorcycle at highway speeds for more than 15 minutes without ear protection, you're damaging your hearing.


Why earplugs make you safer

Our ears are not designed to work at 100 decibels. Humans didn't evolve in an environment where we were riding motorcycles, operating chain saws, working in factories, etc.

And that's why earplugs don't reduce your safety. Earplugs don't "block out" sounds you need to hear, such as sirens, other vehicles, horns blowing, and so on. They reduce the overall sound pressure so that your ears can operate in a more natural range. This

lets you distinguish sounds better. You're more likely to hear that siren because your ears aren't overwhelmed with 100+ decibels of pressure.

There's another way wearing earplugs makes you safer. When I began using earplugs, I immediately noticed that I felt



much less fatigued, especially on long rides. We're all more likely to make mistakes when we're tired. Using earplugs improves your odds.

So which earplugs should I buy?

Disposable foam earplugs work fine for most people. The key with foam earplugs is using them correctly. Roll them tight, insert into the ear canal and let them expand to fill the space. If they feel loose, try again. Tugging upward and backward on the top of your ear with one hand while inserting the earplug with the other is helpful for many people because it straightens the ear canal.

Other kinds of earplugs are also available, up to custom-molded plugs made just for you. The good part is that none of the options are expensive, except for the custom-made earplugs, so you can experiment with different kinds and find what works best for you.

The sooner you begin taking steps to preserve your hearing, the better the results will sound.
